Congratulations....you have been recommended by a member in good standing for membership in the Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry Company. Only a few men are selected each year to join the ranks of this historic military command. All members are required to be gentlemen, and must act accordingly. As a corps of gentlemen, harmony and proper decorum in our ranks is expected at all times. As a historic military command, we are steeped in tradition, and we never forget who we are. The state law governing Historic Military Commands require that military procedures be followed; however, there is no required term of enlistment, no required state training, or call-up for duty. Therefore, there is no conflict of interest for active duty, reserve or National Guard personnel.

The selection process takes approximately two to three months. During this period of time, we expect you to attend all monthly musters and any socials. This will give you a chance to observe the operation of the unit and also gives our members the opportunity to meet you. The Commanding Officer, Adjutant, and First Sergeant will be your primary points-of-contact during the selection process. In order to insure that the selection process moves in a timely manner, we ask that you make yourself available as needed and to complete all necessary documents.

Your application will be investigated, and you will appear before an oral board. The next step in the process involves the ancient custom of the officers and men voting on your membership at a regular monthly muster. If selected, you will then be sworn-in and issued a membership warrant. As a new member you will be assigned a mentor.

In accordance with the state law governing Historic Military Commands, we are required to meet at least once a month. The F.I.L.I. regular monthly muster occurs on the first Monday night of the month. The Armory is usually open by 1730 hours, and our members gather for a social in "The Grand Olde Company Club." The social is followed by the muster meeting, and at the conclusion of the muster meeting, the club is again open.

The current financial obligation for a new member is set at one hundred and twenty five dollars. This fee is divided into two charges. The first charge of fifty dollars is a onetime fee which is paid for processing your application. If your application is rejected, your processing fee will be refunded. The second charge of seventy-five dollars constitutes your annual membership dues. The full one hundred and twenty five dollars is due after you have been notified that your application is approved for membership and paid prior to being formally voted on and sworn-in as a member.

Annual Membership dues are collected from all members prior to the Annual Muster, which is held on the 23rd of August. The Orderly Sergeant is responsible for collecting Annual Membership Dues. Checks are to be made payable to the F.I.L.I. The application processing fee and annual dues are subject to increase by order of the Commanding Officer.

F.I.L.I. COLOR GUARD & HONOR GUARD

The Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry is North Carolina's official Historic Military Command. In order to carry out our mission we provide a period Color Guard that also acts as an Honor Guard. This function falls under the Color Officer who is assisted by the Color Sergeant. New members are encouraged to volunteer for service in the Color Guard. If selected, new members are issued a distinctive Color Guard lapel pin to be worn on your F.I.L.I. blazer. After three years of continuous duty and upon recommendation of the Color Officer, a member is awarded the Cochran Medal, to be worn on your uniform.

A new member on the Color Guard is required to purchase the regulation white pants and regulation black lace-up low quarter shoes. The F.I.L.I. will provide the uniform ball button coat and shako. At the end of each commitment, all F.I.L.I. uniforms will be turned-in to the Color Officer or Color Sergeant. At no time will any part of the F.I.L.I. uniform be taken home after a commitment.

The Color Guard is the face of the Fayetteville Independent Light Infantry, and therefore proper decorum and military discipline is required. Over the years the F.I.L.I. Color Guard has paraded for Presidents, Governors, all levels of elected officials, various military functions, foreign dignitaries, and military societies. Prior military experience is not required.
